Oh-Four Goodness Sake!

This Year's Spring District Convention Leaves Its Mark

Our spring district convention was filled with good news and bad news.

Good news: 17 quartets and 11 choruses participated in the contests this time. Bad news: these numbers were down from spring convention last year.

Good news: the three high school quartets that competed were outstanding. Bad news: there were no college quartets in this contest.

Good news: our **Shoreliner Chorus** went to Peoria feeling confident that our contest set, which had worked so well for us in 2002, would enable us to surpass our old scoring record. Bad news: despite our best efforts, we finished in eighth place (up one notch from last year), though our total score of 590 was an improvement over last year's total of 565. See judges' comments on page 3.

Top five choruses were Lake County Brotherhood of Harmony (842 points), Champaign-Urbana Illini Statesmen (776 points), Elgin Fox Valley Men of Harmony (754 points), Springfield Land of Lincoln **Chorus** (741 points), and Aurora **Lamplighters Chorus** (682 points).

Top five quartets were Aces High (1766 points), Sonic (1754 points), Wound 4
Sound (1641 points), tsunami (1614 points), and Sequel (1549). 3 Men & a Melody, from neighboring Central States District, blew everyone else away, with a total score of 1941 points. Aces High won the right to represent

Illinois District at the 2004 international contest. However, if **Alchemy**, who will compete in the Pioneer District prelims, outscores them, then that quartet will go to international instead. Get the complete contest scoresheets from the district Web site: www.harmonize.ws/ill.

Recognize this?

"Eye-eye-eyeih-oh, uh-weeih-ow-a-oh, yoo-ay-ur-ehee-eh, uh-uha-uh-eh, wiheye-eye-eyeih-oh (eye-ihoh)"

If you said,
"Hey, that's
'My Wild Irish
Rose' without
the consonants, just the
vowel
sounds!"—
you'd be right.

Let's remember to connect those vowel sounds and minimize the unsingable consonants for the legato quality that listeners enjoy.

Here's What the Judges Said . . .

Barry Towner—Presentation

- Saw too many wandering eyes.¹
- Chorus didn't "perform" the song.
- No expression in the sound.¹
- Chorus appeared to be more "into" "Hello, Mary Lou" than "You Must Have Been a Beautiful Baby."
- Gesture on "whole wide world" looked stiff and unconvincing.
- There appeared to be only 50% participation in the chorus²
- Attacks and releases were choppy² (try making every breath half as long).
- Do you like this song? If so, show it. If not, pick a different song.³
- Every move should have a purpose. To make arm gestures look more natural, make believe you're caressing a baby's face—or envision picking up a fragile egg and placing it on a table.³

Paul Wigley-Music

- Problems with synchronization and cleanliness of delivery were the biggest distraction.¹
- Syncopated phrases were a major problem¹ (rehearsing phrases in unison and block chords can correct this).
- Phrase ends lost energy.²
- Dynamic variety was "kind of compressed" (in other words, there wasn't much dynamic contrast between phrases).²
- In the phrase leading into the tag, the upper three voices' release was sloppy.²

Tom McQueeney—Singing

- Lead vocal quality needs more support¹ (two suggestions: "mee may my mo moo" exercise and singing at different volumes for unity of support).
- Some balance opportunities were missed (in other words, there were places where individual voices and sections were out of balance).¹
- Leads were occasionally under pitch.¹
- "Passed me by one summer day" was out of sync.²
- Too much "late-to-target" (ragged) singing.²
- More forward posture will enable the chorus to support the sound better.³
- Try experimenting with different sound/air ratios.³
- Instead of making a "powerful effort," demonstrate "effortless power."³
- "Deliver the gift" at the end of every phrase.
- There were moments of A-level singing—they just were not consistent enough.³
- 1 Applies mostly to "You Must Have Been a Beautiful Baby," but more or less to both songs.
- 2 Applies mostly to "Hello, Mary Lou," but more or less to both songs.
- 3 Applies equally to both songs.

Pope High School in east Cobb County was evacuated for about an hour this morning when staff found a ticking and beeping bookbag off by itself in a classroom.

metronome to school today, according to district spokesman Jay Dillon.

The metronome, a device used by musicians to mark exact time, apparently went off accidentally.
