New Music Introduced Titles Include Possible Contest Songs

Amid our preparations for the holiday season, we have introduced three new repertiore songs: "I'm Sitting on Top of the World," "Oh! You Beautiful Doll." and "Yes Sir. That's My Baby." Actually, the last two songs were in the Shoreliner Chorus repertoire more than 10 years ago, but they are being reintroduced to a chorus that is largely unfamiliar with them. These two songs are also being considered as our set in the upcoming spring district contest, Apr. 26.

Our plan is for all chorus members to be off the paper on "Oh! You Beautiful Doll" and "Yes Sir, That's My Baby" by Jan. 15.

We are also learning some new songs for holiday caroling: "Let It Snow! Let It Snow! Let It Snow!" and "We Need a Little Christmas." At the same time, we are reviewing all the songs in our red holiday music books.

The Salvation Army kettle sing is scheduled to begin at 11 a.m. Saturday, Dec. 21, at the Jewel Foods, 2485 Howard St., Evanston. That means we'll want to be warmed up and ready to start at 11 sharp. We plan to knock off around 3 p.m., at which time we invite as many members as would like to do so to form a group to go to Presbyterian Home to carol for about 30 minutes, as our way of thanking our hosts for their hospitality. Again, former members, inactives, other Barbershoppers, and singers from the community are welcome to sing with us.

Once we reconvene in January, it's back to work on regular repertoire and contest songs. We hope to see you then.

- I will remember that my singers are hard working amateur singers, no more, no less.
- I will strive to be the best vocalist that I can be, for I set the biggest example (well, maybe a tie between me and the singers on the learning tapes.)
- I will ALWAYS remember that the chorus is not there to serve me, I am there to serve THEM.
- I will direct with the utmost meaning and emotion from the first run-through, so that my singers will sing that way from the first runthrough.

- I will be a model Society member, and that includes being in a quartet, being willing to sing in ANY pickup quartet, and participating in every job that needs to be filled other than directing that I am offered.
- I will NEVER beat a dead horse in rehearsal. When a song is done for the night, it is exactly that and nothing else.
