Illinois District Celebrates Early Fall Convention

Alchemy Turns Bronze into Gold

Fall came early to Illinois District this year, or rather Fall Convention did, as our annual autumnal gathering occurred almost a month ahead of its customary time.

As a result of the rescheduling, attendance was lighter than usual. Nevertheless, 19 quartets provided a highly entertaining competition, rivaling last spring's contest for overall quality.

For the first time since 1968, a current member of North Shore Chapter won the district championship. **Geoge Sotos** and his quartet, **Alchemy**, provided a thrilling pair of performances that won first place honors. The other quartets in the top five were **Fired Up**, **Wound 4 Sound**, **Four O'Clock Sharp**, and **tsunami**.

As if winning district weren't enough, George attained a double honor by being the bass of another quartet that has qualified to represent Illinois District in the senior

quartet contest at SPEB-SQSA Midwinter Convention in Biloxi, Miss. That quartet is **Savoir Four**, which also includes former North Shore member **Lynn Hauldren**.

New Tradition Wins Chorus Contest— Bada Bing Bada Boom

It was no big surprise that Northbrook Chapter's **New Tradition Chorus** emerged on top of the 13 choruses in this fall's contest. They turned in an impressive final performance of their soldier set to win their 14th district gold.

Second- through fifth-place choruses were Sound of Illinois Chorus (Bloomington #1), West Towns Chorus (Chicagoland West Suburban), Great Plainsmen Chorus (West Peoria Metro), and Second City Chorus (Rockford Metro).

If references to different degrees of the major scale seem confusing, perhaps the following key to solmization might help.

In any major scale . . .

1st degree=DO (tonic)

major 2nd=RE (supertonic)

major 3rd=MI (mediant)

perfect 4th=FA
(subdominant)

perfect 5th=SOL
(dominant)

major 6th=LA (submediant)

major 7th=TI (leading tone)

octave (8th)=DO (tonic)

We'll discuss minor scales some other time.

Barbershop Craft: Singing In Tune—Part Three

Chapter 6

In prior chapters we mostly addressed internal causes of flatting. There are also a number of external ones that contribute.

Humidity has a depressive effect and will cause the singer to flat because he is emotionally depressed and lacking in vitality.

Poor ventilation, stale air and extreme heat all cause chorus flatting. To counteract, the singer must use extra vitality. He should select quick moving, cheerful songs in major keys, breathe deeply and maintain an excellent posture. An extra measure of director enthusiasm will help under such conditions.

"Dead" auditoriums cause flatting. This can be overcome by speeding the tempo slightly. In a "live" place, slow it down a little.

Programming two or more numbers in the same or related keys immediately together can cause some degree of tonal deafness, resulting in flatting.

Sometimes a slight speeding up of tempo on the slower numbers will eliminate a tendency to go flat.

Chapter 7—Song Effects Considerations

If you are coaching or involved with a chorus that tends to go flat, here are some things you can look for in the composition of the song.

 Most choruses sing more in tune when they are singing major keys, rather than in minor ones. This infers that accustomed hearing affects pitch, since we are used to hearing and singing in major keys Therefore, it is a good idea to have a chorus vocalize in minor keys as well as in the major ones.

- If the chorus has pitch difficulties, avoid pieces filled with chromatic progressions. Stick to the diatonic scale.
- If the vowels in the text are predominantly EH, IH, or EE, this may contribute to flatting since many choruses and quartets control these vowels poorly.
- If the tessitura (average range of the melodic line or voice part) of one or more parts lies consistently in its high register, this could cause flatting.
- The tessitura of one or more of the voice parts that fall consistently in the "break" area will cause flatting. Singers sometimes have only one area of two or three tones that are sung off-pitch habitually. This is most frequent on the several notes just below the break.
- Melodies that descend and suddenly turn upward are harder to keep in tune.
- Intervals that are repeated in sequence tend to lose their proper interval relationship in a short time.
- Many diphthong combinations can cause flatting.

Chapter 8—Interval Adjustment Considerations

 Because we sing unaccompanied, we don't sing on the equal-tempered scale that the piano uses. Therefore, it is necessary to adjust the pitch to tune the chords accurately. If one part is out of tune, check to see if the proper adjustments are being made of the degree of the scale.

- The major 2nd must be sung higher than the piano.
- The major 3rd is raised even more.
- The perfect 4th is sung flatter than the piano sounds. As a result, the actual interval between the raised 3rd and the flatted 4th winds up being very small.
- The perfect 5th is sung only slightly higher than the piano.
- The major 6th is raised much above the piano.
- The major 7th is raised above the piano and is very close to the 8th.
- Flats are lower than enharmonic sharps. Any accidental in a song calls for more treatment than the same sign in the signature would.

Whole steps are usually spaced too close together when singing the ascending scale and too wide when descending. The same is true for half steps to an even greater degree. Vocalizing on whole tone scales and chromatic scales is very good practice. Vocalizing from half steps up to octaves slowly on "lah" will also improve the problem. Wide intervals and chromatics passages are easy targets for flatting.

Chapter 9—Final Discussions

A few more intervals and melodic progressions that are harder to sing in pitch are:

- 4th and 5th degree of a minor scale.
- 3rd, 6th and 7th steps of chords.
- Augmented step (6th to 7th) of the minor scale.
- Leading tones, particularly for the lead and baritone.
- 7th scale step, particularly in modulation.

Singing a sustained note against a melody line that is descending. The sustained

note will usually try to follow the descending part. The mental concept of moving upward against the descending scale will correct this.

Violent or abrupt changes from pp [pianissimo, or very soft] to ff [fortissimo, or veryloud] or vice versa may affect the pitch.

Maintaining an accurate pitch is an ideal to hold before the singers you are coaching. Express proper gratification when it is achieved, providing the sing ing is satisfactory in other aspects. An occasional and moderate departure from true pitch is not a catastrophe. It is inherent in the amateur barbershop singer. It will

happen, hopefully as the exception rather than the rule, so always try to remind your quartets and choruses that it's very rare that an audience or judging panel will react positively to a performance that is flat or out of tune.

Since poor intonation can be heard by most listeners and since there are so many reasons for a singer to either flat, sharp or otherwise deviate from the tonal center, a good and responsible coach will keep this subject in focus as a priority. He will become intimate with concepts and techniques of in-tune singing.

"From the Top"

We have a busy couple of months ahead of us as we embark on one of the most ambitious programs we have ever undertaken: Evanston Harmony Days. This weeklong celebration ties in with a very necessary member recruitment drive that will intensify with our appearance at Evanston Not-for-Profit Days on Sept. 13 and our Open House on Oct. 15.

These events will command a greater time commitment than usual from our members, and we ask you to make every effort to participate. Our chapter's survival relies very much on how successful we will be in attracting new members and generating new public performances for our chorus and quartets in the immediate future, as a result of these events.

Some very important developments of which you should be aware:

- In the second half of October and early November we will participate in Jewel/Osco's Shop and Share program and Dominick's Benefit Days. These are programs that benefit nonprofit organizations like ours at no expense to our members or to our treasury. All we will need to do is get copies of the preprinted slips into as many people's hands as possible, so that those individuals can present the slips to store cashiers when they make their purchases on the designated days. Our chapter will receive a contribution based on a portion of the total purchases for which slips are submitted. More details will be presented in the September Rag.
- The suppliers of our chorus formal uniform, Buy-A-Tux, have closed their retail store, and we need to locate another supplier of the red vests or replace

- the vests entirely. Either way, there will be some changes in our wardrobe operation, and possibly some minor expense to members if the vests are replaced. We're just letting you know in advance.
- Likewise, our ID badge supplier has overhauled their price structure, so that our chapter will incur a sizable setup fee each time new badge stock is ordered. This will, however, be absorbed as new members join the chapter and pay the initiation fee, which most likely will need to be increased slightly.

These factors underscore the importance of our bringing new members into the chapter as quickly as possible and establishing more paid chorus performances. Please cooperate and help out as much as you can.

Jack Baird Old Barbershop Era Music Library Audio files available in MP3 format

Jack Baird, renowned Society arranger, has made available his very extensive library of old recorded music. Jack has recorded all of the vinyl disks that the Society owns. Originally they were on reelto-reel tape, but they are now available on the Society web site in MP3 format.

"I did it so we would have library copies of the sounds of barbershop from the beginning of recorded history to today," Baird said. "I don't think it should just be forgotten."

The files go back to the very first days of recorded music—1894—and run up through 1972. While they make for very interesting listening, the files are extremely valuable as archival material.
