IDAH 2003 in Review

Paul Mimura and **Rick Prieto** attended the Illinois District Academy of Harmony (IDAH) held in Springfield on Friday, Feb. 8 and Saturday, Feb. 9.

Approximately 90 barber-shop enthusiasts participated in teaching and learning barbershop fundamentals. Paul and I took a course in Barbershop technology that included a Friday evening session on chapter use of the Internet; a Saturday morning session on recording chorus and quartet performances, and a Saturday afternoon session on using computer software to digitally record, edit, and improve music performances. Recommendations were made on equipment, software and suppliers. Paul and I have session handouts and will share them with anyone interested in the details.

The \$90 fee included training, hotel, and three country-style meals. There was no extra charge for singing as a large chorus, woodshedding, and learning some new tags.

Gus Knight Dies

Gus Knight passed away Jan. 25 in Sarasota, Fla., at the age of 84.

Very few of us have been involved with North Shore Chapter long enough to remember Gus when he was active. He held numerous chapter offices in the late 1940s, culminating in his presidency during 1950-51.

Gus rejoined our chapter a few years ago following a hiatus of more than 30 years, but was an inactive member during this time.

Some facts about Gus that you might not have known:

- Served in the Naval Reserve during World War II and witnessed the surrender ceremony on the *USS Missouri* in Tokyo Bay.
- Became president, CEO, and director of Glenview State Bank.
- Served two terms as Winnetka village president.
- Was a trustee of the Ravinia Festival Association; treasurer, president, and chairman of the Music Center of the North Shore; treasurer of the Chicago Community Music Foundation; and a trustee of New Trier Township High School.

He is survived by his wife, Frances, three daughters, and four grandchildren. According to his obituary in Pioneer Press, memorial contributions may be made to the Augustus Knight Music Scholarship Fund, in care of **Penny Knight**, 15 Park St., Milton, MA 02186. The fund assists aspiring music students attending college.

Twelve Steps to Using Learning Tapes

—Carolyn Sexton (Sweet Adelines International, Inc. Region 19)

For the novice Barbershopper, having to learn an entire repertoire can be a daunting challenge. Here is a system that helps to simplify and speed up the process.

This is a 12-step program to assist you in learning new music. It is only a suggestion until you learn a system that is best for you.

The success of this program is contingent upon the effective listening skills of the learner—much more than upon one's music background or the ability to read music.

Any of the 12 steps may be repeated before continuing to the next step. But remember, each step is important to the overall results of learning all the notes, words and timing of the song. Do not eliminate any of the steps because it appears to be insignificant.

The Twelve Steps

1. Listen to the music on the master tape with your eyes closed. (This will familiarize you with the notes, timing and general flavor of the song.)
2. Watch the notes on your music while you listen to the tape. Do not sing yet!
3. Again, watch the notes on your music while you listen to the tape. Do not sing yet!
4. Watch the words on your music while you listen to the tape. Please, no singing yet.
5. On a separate sheet of paper (or on the back of your music), write all the lyrics to the new song. Now watch your own paper while you listen to the tape. No, not yet . . . don't sing, please.
6. Watch the notes again while you listen to the tape. Remember, no singing.
7. Watch the words on your music while you listen to the tape. Be careful, not a sound.
8. Try to write down the words again on another

sheet of paper without looking at the printed music. If you have trouble, listen to the tape again. Watch the words and then again try to write them without looking at the music. Stay on this step until you can write down all the correct words without looking back at the printed music. Now, proceed to Step 9.

9. Hurray! Finally you can add your voice. Watch the notes on your music while you HUM along with the tape. Hum . . . hum. Singing is next.
10. Watch the words on your music while you sing along with the tape. Can you believe this? You're really going to SING this song for the very first time. If you have any difficulty, circle the spot(s) on your music as you go all the way through. Then go back and listen (don't sing) to those parts again.
11. Put a clean tape in your tape recorder. On this tape, record as you sing the new part all the way through without looking at your music. (Bet you can hardly wait to hear this step!)
12. VERY IMPORTANT STEP. Watch the music as you listen to your own tape to see if you sang the notes correctly. You should be wonderful. But, should you have any doubts, go back and check your part again on the master tape. Concentrate on listening to the parts you circled earlier to be sure you have made corrections.

CONGRATULATIONS! With a little bit of luck plus all your hard work, you are now the proud possessor of one more selection of music made beautiful by your addition of all the correct notes, words and timing.

Last spring the judges said we need . . .

- More driving rhythm in uptunes.
- Consistent level of facial commitment to each song's message.
- More "dynamic tension" in vocal support and stance.
- Tighter sectional unity—closer blend of voices.
- Completed ends of phrases and eliminated white spaces.
- Warm air added to vocal quality.
- Sounds sung, not words.
- Continuous breath pressure.
- Greater dynamic contrast throughout phrases.

Scholarship Panel Seeks Applicants

The Whittier, Calif. Chapter established a Memorial Endowment Fund in the name of legendary barbershopper **Earl Moon**. He was their director for over 25 years. His long-standing reputation as a premiere faculty member at Harmony College is known to anyone who ever attended Harmony College.

The Earl Moon Memorial Endowment Fund will, in perpetuity, provide tuition payments for a limited number of deserving Barbershoppers each year. Although the fund is managed by Harmony Foundation in Kenosha, the actual selection of candidates is managed by the Whittier Chapter Past Presidents organization.

Earl not only was a great quartet coach, chorus director, arranger and teacher, but also a true champion of the Joe Barbershoppers of our Society. The Whittier Chapter is basing the selection criteria on the principles that characterize such members. Earl gave much of his time and talent to helping these men become better singers and learn the history of our great hobby.

QUALIFICATIONS

The candidate must be:

1. A member of the Society for at least three years.
2. A member who is active and involved in his chapter.
3. A member who has never attended Harmony College and might not otherwise have the opportunity to do so.
4. A member who will personally benefit from attending Harmony College.
5. A member who will bring his new-found knowledge back and share it with his chapter.

GUIDELINES

1. The Earl Moon Scholarship is open to all qualifying members of the Society, funds permitting.

2. Whittier Chapter members are excluded.

3. The candidate's chapter Board of Directors must submit the application and may submit only one application per year.

4. The scholarship will only cover Harmony College tuition. All other expenses, including transportation, are the responsibility of the candidate.

5. The application must be received by the Whittier Chapter Secretary by May 1 of the current year.

6. The Whittier Chapter Past Presidents will screen all applications, make their selections, and submit them to the Whittier Chapter Board of Directors for action.

7. The accepted candidates will be notified by U.S. mail and by e-mail (if applicable). A copy of the notification will also be sent to the candidate's chapter president.

Download *Free* Music Online

There's no better bargain than *free* music! Here's how to get your copies.

Free & Easy music is not only free to get and easy to sing, but is free and easy to find and download from the Society web site. Go to <http://www.spebsqsa.org>, click on "Sing and Perform," then click on "Get Music." There you have two choices that will get you where you want to go. Click on "Download sheet music now!" or "Music Library." Either link will get you to a list of 54 documents, both songs and tags, that you can download for free! Click on the ones you want. They will download to your computer and you can print them out or read them on screen.

There are also a few audio previews of Free and Easy available. To listen to them, click back to the "Get Music" page and then click on the link to "Audio previews of Free & Easy." There you can download audio files and listen to some samples.

There are many great resources on the Society web site. Do a little browsing and you can find many music, singing, performing, and educational resources that you can use with your quartet, chorus, or even for personal interest and self-improvement.
