Four Voices Win Quartet Gold in Portland



Masters of Harmony Score Fifth Win

Breathtakingly scenic surroundings, agreeable weather, excellent transportation, and superlative harmony combined to make our Socitey's 64th International Convention a huge success. Portland's Rose Garden Arena was one of the best contest venues we've attended in years.

The level of singing was elevated once again, as 43 quartets and 21 choruses vied for the title of "best in the world."

Four Voices, from Dixie District, were champions in the 1996 MBNA College Quartet Contest. In the intervening years, they have worked their way up the ladder in international quartet competition to win this year's gold with their smooth, accurate style. It also doesn't hurt to have a bass who looks like Tom Cruise. (Hospitality should be so lucky!)

Other medalists were Uptown Sound (Johnny Appleseed) in second place, **Power Play** (Pioneer) in third, **Riptide** (Dixie) in fourth, and past national Harmony Sweepstakes champs Metropollis (Far Western) in fifth.

The two quartets from Illinois District finished outside of the finals: **Cheers!** came in 11th, and **Gangbusters!** ended up in 29th place.

In the chorus contest, Masters of Harmony (Santa Fe Springs, Calif.) picked up their fifth gold medal, followed, in order, by: **Toronto Northern Lights** (Toronto, Ont.), Alexandria Harmonizers (Alexandria, Va.), Ambassadors of Harmony (St. Charles, Mo.), and Midwest Vocal Express (Greendale, Wis.). Illinois' Great American Chorus (Lake County) placed 16th.

Other highlights: Retiring champion New Tradition Chorus, with a special video produced by former **Shore-liner John Miller**, presented a swan song package that elicited numerous standing ovations. Two quartets from the People's Republic of China made their premier appearance at a SPEB-SQSA convention. The number of attendees under age 30 appeared surprisingly high compared to previous years—we hope this bodes well for our hobby's future.

## Lead's Creed

('Way back in June 1997, "The Baritone's Oath" appeared in the *Harmony Rag*. The response was underwhelming: aside from a note from **Phil Schwimmer**, nothing.

Since then, your editor has seen posted to the Harmonet a series of creeds for each voice part. We believe in providing equal time for all voice parts; therefore, we will present all the creeds, starting with the one for leads, since leads believe they are the alpha and omega of every quartet and chorus.)

- We will not flaunt in front of others the fact that we have the best voice in the group (unless the music calls for it, which, come to think of it, it usually does).
- We will do our best to stay in tune, but won't do too much about that since the other guys have to follow us anyway.
- 3. As consummate gentlemen, we will continue to let the Basses feel like they're the most important part of the group, even though without the melody they would have nothing to harmonize.
- As we focus on shaping and caressing the song, if we forget a word (or all of them), we won't worry too much, since the other guys have to follow us anyway.

- We will never allow a Baritone to sing louder than us, even when we're on the seventh. The melody must be heard!!!
- 6. We will be sensitive to the Tenor's need to feel special. We won't overdo it, though.
- 7. In a chorus, although we will do our best to follow the director, we realize that we have to take advantage of all of the opportunities in a song to show off our wonderful Lead voice. After all, that's what the audience has come to hear, right?
- We will do our best to cover the fact that the Baritone has a weak, emaciated instrument, otherwise he'd be singing Lead.
- 9. When in doubt, pitch it up!!!
- 10. When a Coach/Director advises us that we were under pitch, or too loud, we will always nod appreciatively, all the while knowing that we were just doing what the Composer/Arranger originally intended (even if the Coach/Director IS the Composer/Arranger).
