Power Play, Vocal Majority Lead the Pack in Montreal

More than 10,100 Barbershoppers, their families, and guests attended our Society's 65th annual International Convention in Montreal. This was only the third International to be held in Canada, the first since 1993.

Forty-two quartets competed in this year's contest.

Power Play won the gold with a total of 8099 points, followed by Gotcha! (8072 points),

Metropolis (8051 points), Uptown Sound (7988 points), and Riptide (7967 points). Illinois District's Cheers! finished in sixth place.

In the chorus contest, 21 choruses vied for top honors. Most conventiongoers expected the **Vocal Majority** to pick up their 10th gold medal, and the superchorus from Dallas did not disappoint. The other medalist choruses were **The Northern Lights** (Toronto, Ont., earning their third consecutive silver medal), **Ambassadors of Harmony** (St.

Charles, Mo.), The Alliance (Greater Central Ohio), and Midwest Vocal Express (Greendale, Wis.). Illinois District's representative was the West Towns Chorus from Chicagoland West Suburban Chapter. They

ended up in 19th place.

The college quartet contest was interesting. For the first time, two quartets from Illinois qualified to

compete at international:
Fourtunes Fools (from
Northwestern University)
and Vocal Tonic
(containing one Northwestern student). The former
quartet had to scratch because one of their members
was in a summer program
overseas; Vocal Tonic sang
their way to second place.

Next year's International will be in Louisville, Ky. It's not that far away, and we hope that Northbrook Chapter's **New Tradition Chorus** will qualify to compete there, so it might be wise to register for that one soon.



Here are the events we are planning for Evanston Harmony Days in October . . .

Sunday afternoon, Oct. 12: Shoreliner Chorus will perform a 20-minute set as part of the Evanston Arts Week Music Showcase at Music Institute of Chicago in Evanston. North Shore Chapter will provide various vocal/choral groups to fill about half of the show, including our set. The Chordmasters quartet will sing with the chorus and also perform a few songs on their own.

Monday, Oct. 13 through Friday, Oct. 17: Vocal groups (including, we hope, a barbershop quartet or two) will visit and perform at Evanston schools, nursing homes, and hospitals.

This craft article began in our June issue and continues with Chapters 3 through 5. Because it was intended for publication in nine monthly installments, there are references to subject matter that will be covered in a subsequent month when, in fact, the information appears in this article. If you like, pretend you're reading Chapter 4 in August and Chapter 5 in September . . . but don't wait till then to read those sections. Some of this information will look familiar. There's nothing new in what Fred is teaching us; it's merely presented in a different way.

Barbershop Craft: Singing In Tune—Part Two

Chapter 3

The resonating cavities can be fully utilized only when the throat is relaxed, open and the upper throat arched in a high palate position. The mouth is best used as a resonance chamber when all the muscles, including the tongue, are relaxed and the cavity of the mouth is enlarged. The naso-pharynx and the nasal cavity are most effectively used when a slight opening between the oropharynx and the nasopharynx is maintained, thus allowing an extension of the vibrating column of air emanating from the larynx. The feeling involved in this is similar to yawning.

Alert Posture

- + Accurate Hearing
- + High Arched Tone
 Utilizing the Resonators

Next month, we'll get into more of the discussion of control aspects needed for good singing.

Chapter 4

Breath control is certainly an important factor, and material is available to make it possible to learn or to teach how to breathe properly. It's important to avoid flatting in particular because it is necessary to keep an adequate supply of air exerting pressure against the vocal chords. Wasting breath initially by uncontrolled attacks at the beginning of phrases or taking too little breath causes the singer to run out of air before reaching the end of the phrase. This will result in flatting.

Singing softly seems to cause special problems for many singers. They have the tendency not to energize themselves sufficiently, thus permitting the pharynx to collapse, eliminating the resonance and destroying breath support. This results in a lowering of tone.

To control this, have the singer show his upper teeth slightly when singing softly. This helps take the weight off the voice. An elongated movement of the jaw should be minimized. On the other hand, singing loudly with too heavy a tone quality also leads to flatting, as will excessive vibrato and tremolo. These last two do not allow the other parts to tune to the problem voice.

A quartet or chorus that fails to embrace the basic balance rules of volume relationships as written up in the singing category and the Basic Barbershop Craft Manual will sometimes produce a rough or dissonant sound. This impedes the singers' ability to hear good tuning. The dissonance also may be perceived as being out of tune.

Next month, we will touch upon other causes of flatting. Remember, there's a test coming. Actually, the test is given each time we have a chance to sing together. Next month, we'll get into more of the discussion of control aspects needed for good singing.

Chapter 5

In addition to the reasons covered in prior chapters, there are other causes of flatting. These are basically self-explanatory.

- Unless releases are precise and intensely vitalized, there will often be a slight drop in pitch.
- Slurring, scooping or approaching notes from below will result in flatting.
- Repeated notes in a phrase are often wrongly approached from below. This causes each succeeding note to be slightly lower in pitch.
- Faulty diction causes flatting.
- Attacking a singing consonant below the pitch of the following vowel, and then sliding up to it will produce flatting. The singable consonant must always be sung on the pitch of the following vowel. Particular attention must be paid to L, M and N.
- Insecurity in voice parts, guessing at notes and following rather than thinking for oneself will lead to flatting.
- Overlearning a selection (going stale) likewise leads to flatting.
- Having singers in the wrong voice part may cause them to sing out of tune.

A Cautionary Tale from Down Under

(Let this be a warning to our leads . . . and anyone else tempted to let his pitch go south.)

Man Killed for Singing Sinatra Off-Key

A 25-year-old Filipino man has been stabbed dead for singing a **Frank Sinatra** classic out of tune during a birthday party.

Police officer **Noel Albis** said the victim, **Casimiro Lagugad**, was asked to sing Sinatra's popular song My Way during the party in the Manila suburban city of Caloocan on Sunday.

"Witnesses said the suspect, **Julio Tugas**, 48, one of the guests and a neighbour of

the victim, got irked because Lagugad was singing out of tune," Officer Albis said.

"Tugas suddenly attacked the victim and stabbed him in the neck," he added.

Guests rushed Mr Lagugad to the hospital, but he died while being treated.

Tugas later surrendered to village security officials, who turned him over to authorities.

Police are preparing homicide charges against the suspect, who apparently admitted to the crime.
