More About the April 7 Barbershop Road Show

Here are excerpts from a recent memo in which Society Membership Development Managing Director **Ev Nau** explains what the Road Show is all about.

"Wednesday, April 7 at 7:30 pm, **Joe Liles** will be conducting a 2-hour interchapter meeting called a Roadshow at Northbrook Theatre, Northbrook Park District Leisure Center, 3323 Walters Avenue, Northbrook, IL.

"You will learn some music and sing a whole bunch more. The evening is designed to relight members' fire for barbershopping. Each attendee will receive a packet of music and recruiting ideas that he can do himself. Chapters are encouraged to bring guests and potential members, and any potential member who shows up will receive a free CD. The evening is designed for participation,

fun, quarteting, fun and tags . . . did I mention fun?

"Please, make this an important event that you and your chapter will attend. I am urging you to make the Roadshow your meeting for the week. Hire a bus, if you need to, to make sure that your guys get there. It's important that we rally around our hobby and see what we've been missing in recent years. You are being invited to partake in this Roadshow because your chapter is roughly within a 125-mile radius of the event. You can be there, enjoy it and be home at a fairly reasonable

Here's How to Get to the Road Show . . .

From the north, west, or south: Take I-294 (Tri-State Tollway) to Willow Rd. exit (mile marker 50), approximately 10 miles north of O'Hare. Turn east onto Willow Rd. and go to Landwehr (first stoplight east of the I-294 interchange). Turn left (north) onto Landwehr. Go approximately two miles to Walters (second light north of Landwehr). Turn left on Walters. Approximately one city block on the left side is the Leisure Center. The theatre is on the rear (south side) of the Leisure Center.

From Chicago and southeast: Take I-94 (Edens Expwy.) northbound from Chicago and exit at Dundee Rd. westbound. Take Dundee approximately five miles to Landwehr Rd. Turn left onto Landwehr and proceed one mile to Walters Ave. Turn right onto Walters and proceed to the Leisure Center approximately one city block west.

There is limited parking along the drive that circles the Leisure Center and additional parking in the lot to the west of the center.

Spring Convention and Contest Update

Contest Songs Selected

The two songs that will constitute our contest set have been chosen: "Hello, Mary Lou" and "You Must Have Been a Beautiful Baby." The order of the songs remains to be determined. From now till contest day on March 27, it's polish, polish, polish.

Chorus Photos

Mindy Lazor is coordinating the ordering of all photos of our chorus for this contest. Photos are in color, will measure 8 by 14 inches, and are priced at \$12.75 each (the chapter will cover the \$8.50 packaging/handling charge). Orders must be placed before the shooting session, and photos will be shipped to the chorus after the convention.

We do . . . and in a moment, so will you. Our special Saturday morning rehearsal in Peoria will be at Civic Center Room 134, starting *promptly* at 10 a.m. Each chorus has the room for only 30 minutes, so we need to be on time and conduct our practice expeditiously. Let's be there by 9:45.

Miscellaneous Information

As of March 14, there are 11 choruses registered for this contest. North Shore is second in order of appearance, which means we will be able to watch most of the other choruses.

One that will be of particular interest is Lake County, scheduled to sing tenth. Since the last time they have competed, they have moved their meetings from Libertyville to Hoffman Estates, merged with the Naperville Brotherhood of Harmony, and taken the latter chorus' name to replace their old Great American Chorus moniker. Greg Lyne will direct them.

Membership and Finances

There is an issue that has been nagging some of our members for several years, which I feel I ought to address in my role as V.P. of Membership and Chapter Development. That is the matter of the cost of our chapter's carrying inactive members.

With our hosts allowing us to use their facilities rent-free, and with our having renegotiated our director's compensation, the biggest single expense our chapter faces each year is the insurance premium assessed by SPEBSQSA. This premium is determined by the total number of members in each chapter, and not by the number of active members.

Because North Shore currently has 26 members on the books, our annual insurance assessment, based on categorization as a chapter of 20-40 members, is \$295. However, we have only 17 active members. If our total membership were only 17, we

would be in another plateau (0-19 members) and, therefore, would be billed only \$140 for the year. So you see, because we have nine members on our roster who, despite their many past contributions, currently contribute nothing to the chapter, we are paying an additional \$155 per year that we could otherwise save.

Now, members become inactive for a number of reasons: some may move out of the area, but wish to maintain their identity with and membership in North Shore Chapter; some may develop a chronic illness or disability that prevents them from singing or attending chapter meetings, but they want to maintain their ties to our chapter; some have switched primary chapter affiliation, but still want to continue as dual members with North Shore; some simply no

Prepare Your Entire Body Before You Sing

One of the things you can do to make your rehearsal or performance as a singer more effective is to prepare your body as well as your voice. Some vowel matching and tuning exercises are needed as you prepare for a rehearsal or performance; however, you still need to involve your entire body if you want to sing your very best.

This exercise is one way to relax and prepare your entire body.

Flex your knees, bend over at the waist and keep your upper torso higher than your buttocks. Then allow your arms, shoulders and head to go completely limp. Your upper torso should feel and look like a rag doll. The bent knees assure that there will be no tension below your waist.

Then slowly start breathing deeply for approximately 30 seconds. Having done that, slowly raise your upper torso upward half-way, with your knees still bent, and repeat the deep breathing. After another 30 seconds, slowly raise your body to an upright position. Keep your knees flexed, slightly roll your shoulders back and elongate the back of your neck. At this full and upright position, do the same deep breathing for another 30 seconds.

This is a great way to take all of the tension out of your body and to remind yourself how to breathe correctly. You can then start your rehearsal or performance and sing with ease.

Riser Discipline

Every now and then, it's a good idea to review some basic concepts that can make our time together more enjoyable and productive. One of these is riser discipline.

At its most elementary level, riser discipline is nothing more than common sense and courtesy. When the chorus is standing during rehearsal, all members' attention is focused on the director or whomever is up in front. There is no idle conversation, no wisecracking, no singing or humming aside from what the chorus or selected sections may be working on at a particular time. When the pitchpipe blows, there should be silence, so that all members can hear the pitch and prepare to sing in tune.

Finally, riser discipline should prevail whether the chorus is actually standing on risers or not. Let's all give each other the respect we deserve as musicians.

Members are encouraged to take an interest in their chapter.

To find out more about chapter Board actions, ask Secretary Pete Brandt for a copy of the minutes from the latest Board meeting (or from any other month you desire).

To find out more about chapter finances, ask Treasurer Ed Price for the latest treasurer's report.

How to Achieve Depth with Brilliance and Brilliance with Depth

Here's something Jay Giallombardo has been teaching the New Tradition Chorus that can also help us.

We all know there are 12 basic, pure vowel sounds. Singing coach and Music judge **Steve Jamison** introduced our New Tradition colleagues to the concept of complementary vowel sounds—that is, that most of the basic vowel sounds consist of pairs that share the same aural characteristics.

Examples of complementary pairs of vowel sounds:

OO (as in too) - EE (as in tee) OOH (as in look) - IH (as in bit) AW (as in call) - A (as in cat) OH (as in go) - AY (as in day) UH (as in love) - EH (as in get) That's the principle behind our "We sing late at night" and "You look so on time" chord exercises.

Asking a singer to sing "darker," "brighter," or "lighter" generally makes no sense, as the singer has no frame of reference and lacks the technical knowledge to make the needed adjustment. It's much easier for a singer who is producing too "thin," "heavy," "dark," or "bright" a tone to introduce enough of the complementary vowel into the vowel sound being produced in order to remedy the problem.

Here's a simplified explanation, excerpted from a recent memo from Jay to chorus members: If the vowel is dark (OO, OH, AW), brighten with EE, AY, A. Keep the bulk of the tongue forward in the mouth. If the vowel is bright (EE, IH, AY, A), add the feeling of open throat. It is not bright *or* dark, it is: bright AND dark.

Brilliance with Depth. Depth with Brilliance. How do you do that? Blend the complementary vowels into one . . . OO/EE, OH/AY, etc.

The typical error: a bright vowel is thin without depth. Solution: add depth.

The typical error: a dark vowel is heavy without brilliance. Solution: add brilliance.

Goal: fully resonant sound 100% of the time . . .

Attention, Readers!

The North Shore Harmony Rag is making its grand entrance into the 21st century. Effective with this issue, we are converting to e-mail distribution of copies of the newsletter for nonmembers of North Shore Chapter. This conversion will enable us to conserve a few trees while saving money on printing and postal expenses. It will also enable us to deliver news to nonmembers in a more timely manner than we did via snail-mail.

When we distributed printed copies of the newsletter by mail, we needed to produce and distribute at least 200 copies of each issue in order to qualify for the reduced bulk mail postal rate. With e-mail, there is no minimum requirement.

- PROBE officers and exchange bulletin editors (to make up the remainder).

I have most of the e-mail addresses I need, but I'm still lacking a few. To err on the side of caution, I'm asking all of you nonmembers who received this issue by snail-mail and wish to receive the *Rag* regularly to furnish me with your e-mail address, and I'll add it to my list. I would like to minimize the number of copies to be mailed first class. Thank you for your cooperation.
