You Practice Your Music! Why Not Practice Your Face?

It's been generally accepted that an audience reacts as much, if not more, to what it sees as it does to what it hears! We've all sat in the seats enough to have experienced both positive and negative reactions to what we see of the performer, whether it's the Alexandria Harmonizers or the New York Philharmonic.

We're supplied with sheet music, learning tapes, vocal coaching and every conceivable tool to help us learn the words and notes, but none of these addresses the issue that has a great deal to do with our success (or lack thereof) in reaching our audience, and that's your face.

Whether we realize it or not, every time we sing we practice our face, and practice, as we know, does not make perfect, it makes permanent! A quick look around the risers will all too often reveal that men are concentrating so hard on words and notes, timing, etc., that their faces

assume the appearance of intense concentration. That would be good if we sang songs whose lyrics had to do with that subject, but they don't! Moon, Spoon and June don't rhyme with scowl! If you want to know what you look like, here's a handy tool. It's called a mirror, and there's very likely one in your bathroom. Stand in front of it at least three times a week and mouth the words to a song. Every day is better. Does your face reflect the emotion (whatever it is) of the lyrics you're mouthing? Are you really smiling? Do you really look sad?

As you look at your face, without raising your head, lift your forehead! The whole upper part of your face should follow along. This will help raise the roof of your mouth and create a larger open space, which will increase your resonance as well. A side benefit, of course, is that it prevents you from frowning and makes it much easier to smile with your eyes.



Guaranteed, if you practice your face at home. You'll find it much easier to put that face on when you sing. If we all do that, our audience (AND THE JUDGES) will enjoy our performance more and our presentation scores will climb!
